## About the Playwright

Alfred Uhry's first play, *DRIVING MISS DAISY*, won him popular recognition as well as a Pulitzer Prize for Drama and an Academy Award. In *THE LAST NIGHT OF BALLYHOO*, he once again returns to his Jewish heritage for his material. Born in Atlanta, in 1936, the son of German Jews Ralph and Alene Fox Uhry, Uhry had a first hand acquaintance with Southern Jewish society and the Atlanta Standard Club.

Uhry said that after writing about his own grandmother (Miss Daisy), he had some other ideas and wanted to write about prejudice against "the other kind." In 1996, when the Olympics commissioned Uhry to write a play through the Alliance Theatre, he wanted to turn the spotlight on Atlanta. He saw 1939 with the furor over Scarlett and Hitler as the perfect time to get at the message he wanted to present.

In an interview with Dana Ivy, Uhry confirms that Ballyhoo is real - a German-Jewish debutante ball which he himself attended in the 50's at the age of 16. The Standard Club and the Venetian Club are equally real as was the "other kind" stigma. In discussing this play, Uhry states that Joe Farkas is "consciously a Jewish person." All the other people are just Southern. Uhry's instincts were correct. When *THE LAST NIGHT OF BALLYHOO* opened on Broadway in 1997, the American Theatre Critics Association, the Outer Critics Circle and the Drama Desk named it Best Play. Additionally, it won the Tony Award.
