Director's Note

Although "Alabama Story" is set in 1959, its themes of censorship, book banning, and discrimination are more relevant than ever. Just last September, the Alabama Public Library Service created an "inappropriate books" list, and as a result, they flagged a children's book simply because the author's last name is "Gay."

As someone who has worked in a library for the past ten years, I believe "Alabama Story" truly encapsulates the importance of having access to books, because the knowledge and information embedded in literature can shine a light on the problems which plague our society.

"Alabama Story" is able to intertwine the issues of book banning and racial tension in a way that is smart and serious. It's a perfect combination of humor and drama that is intended to make audiences consider how our collective choices affect our present and our future.

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
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
